It's summertime—finally!!

With the arrival of the spring blossoms and warm weather comes outdoor activities, spring cleanup, lawn care and summer projects.

Nice weather brings people outdoors. Please be considerate of your neighbors. Windows are open, welcoming the fresh air; be aware of noise pollution especially during night hours (10 pm to 7 am). Besides prohibiting noxious weeds, Village Ordinance 94-52 prohibits public nuisances such as animals running at large, fireworks, junk vehicles, and loud and unnecessary noise.

Dog Regulations Be considerate of your neighbors and don't let your dog roam outside the yard or bark excessively. When walking around the neighborhood or on one of our many trails, please pick up your litter and clean up after Fido. Dogs must be licensed, leashed and within your control.

Public Safety

Drivers — please SLOW down and observe the speed limit. The speed limit is ONLY 25 mph in most areas of the village. Be aware and courteous to pedestrian traffic and keep our bicyclists and motorcyclists safe by being mindful of their presence on the road.

Walkers and runners — be mindful of your own safety. When walking or running on roadways, please walk against traffic and wear reflective gear after dusk.

Project permits We'd like to remind you of ordinances and policies to adhere to when you are working on projects. All building projects, such as fences, decks, home/garage additions or a new pool, require building permits. Forms are on the website www.villageofsherwood.org. Navigate to the sidebar *Village Departments*, then click on *Building & Planning*. If you have any questions, please call the office (989-1589) or the Village Building Inspector Paul Hermes (858-0102).

Structures that modify use of the land such as fences, driveways, patios, decks or pools require a Land Use Permit. Please submit the Land Use form, a \$25 permit fee and a copy of your plan for review. A garage or home addition requires a building permit because of the

inspections required. These permits are \$125 and \$433 respectively. Siding and Roofing permits are \$50.

And lastly, don't forget to call Digger's Hotline to locate utilities in your yard before digging!

Water Conservation Ordinance The Village has a water conservation ordinance in force for the summer months.

Outside watering is not allowed during the day between 11 am and 6 pm. Outside watering is allowed on odd days for odd numbered addresses and even days for even numbered addresses before 11 am and after 6 pm. Special permits for watering newly installed lawns can be obtained at the village office.



No Dumping Allowed! Your neighbors are watching! It is unlawful to dump on vacant lots.

Violators will be reported to the Calumet County Sheriff's office. Please use the village yard waste site to dispose of brush and clippings NOT empty lots. ▲

Noxious weeds & rank growth



Pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes, Section 66.96 and Section 3(f) of Village of Sherwood Ordinance 52, notice is hereby given to each person who owns, occupies, or controls land in the Village of Sherwood, Calumet County, WI to DESTROY ALL NOXIOUS WEEDS AND CUT RANK GROWTH on such property. Noxious weeds are: Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge, Field Bindweed (Creeping Jenny), Lythrum (Purple Loosestrife) and Multiflora Rose.

Rank growth includes lawns, grasses, and other vegetative growth on undeveloped lots or platted parcels of land which exceed twelve (12) inches in length except for property located in designated floodplain, wetland, or storm water detention areas.

If you are served with a violation notice to cut or destroy noxious weeds and/or rank growth, you have ten (10) days to comply. If you fail to comply within the time period, the Village will destroy all weeds and rank growth at the expense of the owner and said charges shall be placed on the tax roll as a special charge against the property. ▲

SHERWOOD UTILITY NEWS



The **2010 Consumer Confidence Report (CCR)** is included on pages 4 through 6 of this newsletter.

Communities are required to provide information concerning water quality for the previous monitoring year by the Federal government. This report identifies contaminant and monitoring violations, and potential health effects created by those violations, based on results reported to the Wisconsin DNR. Sherwood had two different water sources in 2010. From January 1 through June 30, 2010, Sherwood distributed groundwater from wells 5 & 6, and from July 1 to December 31, 2010, Sherwood distributed purchased surface water from the City of Appleton. Health Information

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Number of Contaminants Required to be Tested

This table displays the number of contaminants that were required to be tested in the last five years. The CCR may contain up to five years worth of water quality results. If a water system tests annually, or more frequently, the results from the most recent year are shown on the CCR. If testing is done less frequently, the results shown on the CCR are from the past five years.

Hydrant flushing scheduled



The Sherwood Utility Department will begin its annual flushing program on Monday, July 11 and will continue through Friday, July 22. Flushing will be done during day time hours from 7:30 am to 3 pm. Monday through Friday.

Utility customers are advised to check for discoloration prior to washing clothes. If employees from the water department are seen working in the area, please use as little or if possible, no water for 45 minutes to insure the water has settled and discoloration is not drawn into the home's water heater or softener. We advise that you wait until 4 pm before washing clothes to minimize potential discoloration. Under certain circumstances, a hydrant being flushed 6-8 blocks away can cause water discoloration.

If discoloration persists, customers are advised to wait another 30-45 minutes, then draw off the discolored water through the COLD WATER FAUCET ONLY. Flushing removes most of the sediment of natural minerals such as iron and sulfur that are harmless but can discolor water.

The Utility will attempt to keep inconvenience to a minimum and asks for the cooperation of the public during the flushing program. ▲
