## From the Administrator. . .

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Welcome to Summer! Construction season is upon us and we have projects already underway, as well as others to come.

It's likely you have noticed the new road and storm-water detention pond under construction in the Wanick Park area. The *Knight Drive Extension* will serve as a commercial roadway, looping Castle Drive to the planned *Upper Wanick Park* area. In its interior, the road will serve some commercial venture(s) - Hopefully including a grocery store. Trustees David Miller, Jim Rath, and Bob Benz have been appointed to help promote this area as Sherwood's grocery store location.

Because we are in the process of planning the final layout for the *Upper Wanick Park* area, only the roadway base will be placed this summer. This will allow construction trucks next year working on the *Upper Wanick Park* site to compact the roadway base, while not tearing up any new curbing and asphalt. Developing *Upper Wanick Park* will be an extensive project and construction will likely last from late-Spring into early-Fall, after which time the parking and roadway areas will receive a brand new asphalt treatment.

Regarding the Park, three concepts are being forwarded by the *Citizen Committee* to the *Parks, Rec. & Urban Tree (PRUT) Board* for consideration. One will be chosen by the PRUT as their recommended concept. Before being sent to the Village Board for final approval, the concept will be highly scrutinized, final construction estimates will be documented, and post-construction operation and maintenance costs will be reviewed. Funds to support the estimated \$2.5M project have already been set aside. We thank all members of the committee for their time and efforts.

Also underway at this time, is a study focused on developing a downtown re-development strategy. The study will provide a loose blueprint for targeting downtown commercial entities that can survive within the constraints of our small community.

Water line rehabilitation projects will be underway in the coming months, including water main replacement at Sunset Lake Court and Queen's Court, while roadway rehabilitation will occur on State Park Road between Pigeon Road and the State Park, and on King's Way, King's Court, and Royal Court.





*Yard Waste Site*




**Starting May 1** the yard waste site will be open at its regular seasonal schedule:

## Summer's here again!

Nice weather brings people outdoors. Please be considerate of your neighbors. Windows are open, welcoming the fresh air; be aware of noise pollution especially during night hours (10pm to 7am) Besides prohibiting noxious weeds, Village Ordinance 94-52 prohibits public nuisances such as animals running at large, fireworks, junk vehicles, and loud and unnecessary noise.

### Help Our Birds!

Please be aware that the netting used to cover grass seed and should not be left in place as many landscapers suggest. Robins, Orioles, and other nest builders find this netting appealing and they will pull up strands of the plastic. This is a danger to them! Recently, a Robin was captured during a bird hike, the netting had not only entangled a foot but as the Robin struggled to free itself, had also gotten the plastic over its head and around its neck. Thankfully, the plastic was able to be peeled off to set the bird free. This problem can be avoided by simply rolling up the netting and discarding it once the grass is at a point that it can be cut.


### Project Permits!

The past three months the pump has needed to be pulled at least every two weeks because of the over abundance of baby wipes caught in the impellers. This is a *very* time consuming and expensive process. Please do not put non-biodegradable products into the sewer system. ▲

## *Noxious weeds & rank growth*




Pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes, Section 66.96 and Section 3(f) of Village of Sherwood Ordinance 52, notice is hereby given to each person who owns, occupies, or controls land

in the Village of Sherwood, Calumet County, WI to DESTROY ALL NOXIOUS WEEDS AND CUT RANK GROWTH on such property. Noxious weeds are: Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge, Field Bindweed (Creeping Jenny), Lythrum (Purple Loosestrife) and Multiflora Rose.

Rank growth includes lawns, grasses, and other vegetative growth on undeveloped lots or platted parcels of land which exceed twelve (12) inches in length except for property located in designated floodplain, wetland, or storm water detention areas.

If you are served with a violation notice to cut or destroy noxious weeds and/or rank growth, you have ten (10) days to comply. If you fail to comply within the time period, the Village will destroy all weeds and rank growth at the expense of the owner and said charges shall be placed on the tax roll as a special charge against the property. ▲

## *Sherwood Water & Sewer News*



The **2011 Consumer Confidence Report (CCR)** is included below. Communities are required to provide information concerning water quality for the previous monitoring year by the Federal government. This report identifies contaminant and monitoring violations, and potential health effects created by those violations, based on results reported to the Wisconsin DNR. Sherwood has one active well, but has not distributed water from that well since 2010. In 2011 Sherwood distributed purchased surface water from the City of Appleton. If you would like to know more about the information contained in this report, please contact Bruce Genskow at (920) 858-2591. The Utility Commission meets at 7 pm the third Monday of each month in the Village Hall Boardroom.

### Health Information

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

### Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include: rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

**Number of Contaminants Required to be Tested**

This table displays the number of contaminants that were required to be tested in the last five years. The CCR may contain up to five years worth of water quality results. If a water system tests annually, or more frequently, the results from the most recent year are shown on the CCR. The results of less frequent testing are shown on the CCR from the past five years.

### **Strong Women**


