From the Village Administrator...

Welcome to Summer!

As you see here (right) the roadway connection at the Mobil station along STH 55/114 up to Clifton Road has been officially opened. This access provides residents and State Park users a safer entry/exit on to the highway and a new perspective looking west into the Fox River Valley. By year's end, the Clifton Road/Post Office intersection will be closed to heavy truck traffic. In the future, trucks will be mandated to use the new roadway in an effort to decrease congestion and increase traffic safety at the Post Office intersection.

Permanent redirection of truck traffic serves to prepare the area at the crest of the hill for future commercial and residential development, in accordance with the approved *Downtown Master Plan*. The Community Development Authority (CDA) continues to work with a local developer on plans for limited housing and commercial ventures hopefully in the near future.



The Condon Road extension is open (depicted above and lower left) provides an alternative connection hookup to Hwy 114 and High Cliff's Gateway (Spring Hill/Clifton Roads).



The next construction project on tap this Summer is the urbanization of *Farmington Meadows*. This 53-lot subdivision lies north of Mustang Pond on the east side of Stommel Road and will improve the roadway connection between Lake Breeze Drive and Stommel Road. Completion of this project will mark the conclusion of the Village Board's 3-year, roadway urbanization project schedule. It also means we will refocus our efforts next year on local roadway maintenance projects.

In other roadway-related news, you will soon notice a parking ban for portions of Spring Hill Drive and State Park Road on both sides of the road as you leave High Cliff State Park. Our community continues to grow in size and activity and the narrowness of local roads makes it increasingly necessary to restrict on-street parking to allow emergency vehicles, local maintenance companies, Park visitors and residents with trailers to be able to pass through unfettered. Further, the popularity of local rummage sales and the High Cliff Triathlon at times can make the roads impossible to navigate, in addition to many who use the roadways for walking, jogging, and biking. Beyond this year, the Board will continue reviewing and implementing parking restrictions throughout the Village.

Behind the scenes, the Plan Commission and Village Board have been busily reviewing the 'signage' portion of the Zoning Code and the Municipal Code in an effort to bring these documents on-line for easier readership. We anticipate having both projects completed within the next 90 days.

Electronics Recycling

E-RECYCLING EVENTS DATES SET FOR SEPTEMBER 9 & 23

Calumet County residents -- time to help the environment and clean up your homes! Get rid of the broken and unwanted electronics that are taking up space in your homes on **Wednesdays, September 9 and 23 from 2:00 to 6:00 pm.**

The September 9 program will be held at the Harrison Town/Village Public Works building at Hwy 114 and State Park Road, while the September 23 program will take place at the Chilton Public Works facility on Maple Street behind the Chilton Kwik Trip. Calumet County and its local governments are partnering with Norsec Computer Recyclers to make this program available.

Acceptable electronics include: TV's, VCR's, CRT's, CPU's, printers, monitors, scanners, DVD players, cell phones, power tools, microwaves, window air conditioners, dehumidifiers, washers, dryers, and refrigerators. There will be a \$5 fee for CRT computer monitors, \$10 for televisions under 30", and \$20 for televisions over 30". There is no fee for flat screen TV's. ELECTRONICS BAN IN EFFECT

Sept. 1, 2010, Wisconsin's Electronics Recycling Law (2009 Act 50) prohibits disposal of certain electronic devices in Wisconsin landfills, burning in an incineration facility, or placing these devices in a container intended for disposal or incineration [s.287.07(5), Wis. Stats.].

This ban does not require a solid waste treatment or disposal facility to retrieve a consumer video display device (a television or computer monitor with a tube or a screen that is at least 7" in its longest diagonal measurement) if doing so is impractical or would jeopardize the safety of a worker, or if the device has been damaged to the extent that recycling is no longer practical or feasible [(s.287.07(5)(b), Wis. Stats.)].

Electronic devices included in the ban are computers, printers, video display devices, peripherals, fax machines, DVD players, VCRs & other video players (i.e. DVRs). ▲

PARK USE REMINDER - Our Village Parks System adopted the WI DNR's Carry-In/Carry-Out Policy. This means all items brought into a park are to be taken out when you leave. This includes recyclables and rubbish! Help keep our parks looking beautiful by making sure all items are taken with you after your visit. **Thank you!**


Working on projects?

PERMITS NEEDED FOR CONSTRUCTION, REMODELING, AND LAND USE PROJECTS

If you are planning any construction or remodeling projects, we would like to remind you building permits are required for most projects, including:

GENERAL PERMITS: Installation/Replacement of siding and roofing, construction of stoops, ramps, and sheds, and home alterations/remodeling projects.

TRADEWORK PERMITS: Separate permits are required for any electrical or plumbing work, to ensure your project meets Village zoning regulations and complies with Village and State building codes, but also lets us assist you in achieving a project that is safe and structurally sound.



LAND USE PERMITS: Land use permits are also required for the construction, erection, and placement of fences, decks, concrete slabs, patios, pergolas, and decks on properties as well as expansion of existing land use projects. This ensures

the location, height, materials and maintenance of projects comply with Village regulations to prevent the creation of nuisances. For more information, contact the Village Office for further clarification.

Permits must be obtained before work begins.

Residents/Contractors are required to display permits in conspicuous locations. If you see work in your neighborhood being done without a permit, please alert the Village Office.

Bird City Update

BIRD FEEDER MAINTENANCE

The hot and dry days of summer are here. Regular cleaning of your bird feeders and water sources is necessary to maintain good health of your local avian visitors.



Hummingbird feeders should be washed with warm soapy water and rinsed well at least once a week or sooner if you note the clarity of the sugar water is degrading. Consider keeping the feeder just half full to encourage fresh food replenishment.

Seed feeders do well with a good cleaning once per month with a half and half bleach and water solution. Let the feeder dry thoroughly before returning it to service.

Your birds will appreciate your extra effort to reduce the passage of viruses to other birds. ▲

Recently, we have received complaints of people allowing their dogs to run freely in the parks. No person shall permit any dog, cat or other pet to run at large in any park or on trails per local regulations. Citations will be issued in the event you don't have

your dog on a leash. ▲

Dates of pick-up are bi-weekly (East Side / West Side) on Friday mornings. Be sure to place your recyclables on the opposite side of the driveway from your garbage canister.

PAPER

ACCEPTED PAPER ITEMS

- Newspapers & Inserts
- Cardboard & Paperboard (cereal/cracker boxes)
- Junk Mail
- Office Paper
- Milk, Juice, & Soup Cartons
- Phonebooks, Books, Magazines, & Catalogs



DISPOSAL GUIDELINES

- Place shredded paper in paper bag, secure, and label
- Paper is to be placed in paper bags, in cardboard boxes, or bundled with twine securely

NOT ACCEPTED

- No Paper Contaminated by Food or Grease
- No Tissues or Tissue Paper
- No Gift Wrap



GLASS & METAL

ACCEPTED ITEMS

- Aluminum Bottles & Cans
- Steel, Tin, and Bi-Metal Cans
- Empty Aerosol Cans
- Food & Beverage Glass Bottles & Jars

NOT ACCEPTED

- No Aluminum Pans or Foil
- No Empty Paint Cans

DISPOSAL GUIDELINES

- Empty and rinse all bottles and containers
- Remove and discard all screw caps



CARTONS

ACCEPTED ITEMS

- Milk, Juice, Broth, & Soup Cartons



PLASTIC

ACCEPTED PLASTIC ITEMS

- All Plastic Bottles & Containers Produce, Bakery, & Deli Containers (1-7)
- Soda, Water, & Other Drink Bottles
- Dairy Containers & Lids
- Food and Household Bottles, Jars, and Jugs

NOT ACCEPTED

- No Plastic Bags of any Kind
- No Wrap or Film
- No Motor Oil Bottles
- No Styrofoam of any Kind



DISPOSAL GUIDELINES

- Empty and rise all bottles and containers
- Remove and discard all screw caps

ITEM(S) NOT LISTED..

BATTERIES

Alkaline (single use, non-rechargeable) are not considered toxic and may be disposed in regular garbage; Rechargeable can be recycled (drop off sites include Target and Outagamie County Solid Waste & Recycling, Best Buy, Lowe’s, or Ace Hardware of Appleton); Lead Acid Vehicle are banned from landfills and must be recycled

(can be disposed at Outagamie County Solid Waste & Recycling). **ELECTRONICS**— See pg. 6 for Calumet County’s upcoming electronics recycling opportunities.

FLOURESCENT LIGHT BULBS & HOUSEHOLD APPLIANCES— Listings of disposal sites are available at the Village Office (989-1589) or go online to our website, (www.villageofsherwood.org) under Resident Information > Garbage & Recycling for a complete listing of sites that accept these items.

HAZARDOUS WASTE— Calumet County provides dates for disposal. Call the Village Office to hear about upcoming dates. **LATEX**

PAINT— Layer paint on paint tray or plastic bag; let dry; continue process until old paint is used; dispose in trash. **PLASTIC BAGS**— Dispose clean and dry bags (remove receipts) at local retail chains such as Piggly Wiggly (Kaukauna), Kohl’s, Lowe’s, Target, and Walmart (Appleton) in dropboxes in store fronts.

PROPANE TANKS— Due to flammability, propane tanks cannot be disposed of during our hazardous waste disposal opportunities; dispose at Outagamie

County Solid Waste & Recycling (920) 832-5277; accepts tanks for \$5 (small tanks accepted free). **YARD WASTE**— Grass and shrub clippings, branches, leaves, weeds, and garden trash can be disposed at our Yard Waste Site (see pg. 3 for dates and times). The site does **NOT** accept rocks/stones, containers of any kind (including paper yard bags), dirt or sod, and contractor-like debris.

Q: WHERE CAN I DISPOSE OF OLD PRESCRIPTION MEDICATIONS SAFELY?

A: There are 24-hour drop off sites near our area, where you can safely dispose of unused or expired medications: Calumet County Sheriff’s Dept. (206 Court Street, Chilton), or Appleton Police Dept. (222 S. Walnut Street).
