Ordinances & Regulations

NUISANCES (#94-52)

Noxious Weeds

Pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes, Section 66.96 and Section 3(f) of Village of Sherwood Ordinance 52, notice is hereby given to each person who owns, occupies, or controls land in the Village of Sherwood, Calumet County, WI to DESTROY ALL NOXIOUS WEEDS AND CUT RANK GROWTH on such property. Noxious weeds are: Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge, Field Bindweed (Creeping Jenny), Lythrum (Purple Loosestrife) and Multiflora Rose.

Rank growth includes lawns, grasses, and other vegetative growth on undeveloped lots or platted parcels of land which exceed **eight (8) inches in length** except for property located in designated floodplain, wetland, or storm water detention areas.

If you fail to comply to the parcel vegetation height allowance, the Village or a subcontractor will destroy all weeds and rank growth at the expense of the owner and said charges shall be billed if left unpaid. ▲

Noise Regulations

Nice weather brings people outdoors. Please be considerate of your neighbors. Windows are open, welcoming the fresh air; be aware of noise pollution especially during night hours (10 PM to 7 AM). Besides prohibiting noxious weeds, Village Ordinance 94-52 prohibits public nuisances such as animals running at large, fireworks, junk vehicles, and loud and unnecessary noise.

Dog Owners — Please be considerate of your neighbors and don't let your dog roam outside the yard or bark excessively. When walking around the neighborhood or on one of our many trails, please pick up your litter and clean up after Fido. Dogs must be licensed, leashed and within your control. ▲

Public Safety Regulations

- **Noncompliance with Recordkeeping and Compliance Data** — Between 07/13/2013 — 07/23/2013 there was a missed monitoring requirement: The prescribed samples were taken but incorrectly preserved, thus invalidating the analyses and results. A review of the regulatory requirements was completed with the commercial laboratory. Subsequent samples were analyzed for disinfection byproducts were found to be in the acceptable ranges. The resolution was completed in Fall of 2013. ▲

Roadway projects will begin in earnest within 30 days. Scheduled for this year are:

Paving: Wanick Park parking and trails; Knight Drive.

Re-paving: Sundown Court, Timberline Drive and Spring Hill Drive (from Palisades to High Cliff State Park).

Roadway urbanization (curb & gutter): State Park Estates IV (Nature Lane), Mustang Acres II (Mustang Drive), and Lakeshore Estates-South (Lakeshore Lane).

Roadway construction: Condon Haul Road between the Mobil Station and Clifton Road.

This Summer we are continuing efforts to plan out the *historic downtown area* via public meetings, surveys, focus groups, and conducting design workshops. Goals of the process are to help revitalize local commercial establishments, entice new residential and commercial projects, and develop a local brand (theme & logo).

Sherwood Sewer & Water Utility News - Consumer Confidence Report 2013

The 2013 Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) is included below. Communities are required to provide information concerning water quality for the previous monitoring year by the Federal government. This report identifies contaminant and monitoring violations, and potential health effects created by those violations, based on results reported to the Wisconsin DNR. Sherwood has one active well, but has not distributed water from that well since 2010. In 2011, Sherwood distributed purchased surface water from the City of Appleton. If you would like to know more about the information contained in this report, please contact Bruce Genskow at (920) 858-2591. The Utility Commission meets the third Monday of each month at 7 PM in the Village Hall Boardroom.

Health Information — Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Educational Information — The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

This table (directly above) displays the number of contaminants that were required to be tested in the last five years. The CCR may contain up to five years worth of water quality results. If a water system tests annually, or more frequently, the results from the most recent year are shown on the CCR. The results of less frequent testing are shown on the CCR from the past five years.
