## EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

**Recreation Coordinator Assistant (Seasonal)**- We are accepting applications for a seasonal position-weekly up to 20 hours per week, occasional evenings and weekends included, for 10 weeks during the months of June, July and August. Compensation is \$10/hour. Work sites will be the Village Offices, Community Center, Parks, Recreation Trails and other sites as necessary. Duties include assisting the Rec Coordinator, park maintenance, event staffing, and working closely with all other Staff.

**Yard Waste Site Attendant (Seasonal)**- We're looking for individuals interested in working at our municipal yard waste site (on the corner of Kesler Rd., and County M). Yard Waste Site Attendants are responsible for greeting residents to the site, validate residency in the Village of Sherwood, and inspect loads to ensure proper compliance of waste. Hours vary, but you can expect to work up to 20 hours per month on days that the yard waste site is open. Those days are Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2-6PM and Saturdays from 9AM to 1PM starting in May and going through October, with additional hours available in November. Compensation is \$11.50 an hour.

## From the Village Administrator

Hello early-Spring! It's time to think about warming weather, Spring planting, and outside projects – including home, business and roadway construction.

Last year was another good year for home construction as we issued 29 new home permits. This year will see a slowdown due to the lack of available lots. However, at least one new subdivision appears on the way as a 41-lot *Concept Plan* was approved in February and will likely begin digging infrastructure improvements this Summer. It will be located on the west side of Stommel Road, linking Nature Way and Cliffview Drive.

In the *historic downtown* arena, the *Community Development Authority (CDA)* recently watched the opening of our newest business, the *Play & Grow Learning Center* (daycare facility), in January. Also, the Maurer Building at STH 55/114 & CTH 'M' was sold from Scott Amrhein (glass studio) to another local Sherwood resident, the Sonsthagens, who are busy transforming their new space into a pottery shop. In the future, they plan to have it become a working pottery studio open to the public for both retail sales and classes.

Amongst other things, the CDA continues to dialogue with and focus on bringing new types of housing opportunities to the Village, including some condominium development and senior housing. These are two housing areas residents have voiced interest in having as our community continues to mature and diversify. Currently, there are very limited condo offerings and no senior housing available. But, as our population continues to grow and mature, these different types of housing are coming into demand as aging residents want to downsize their homes and have less property maintenance.

Additionally, the CDA continues to make available funds supporting a *50/50 Business Grant Match Program* to help business owners make upgrades to their properties. In the near future, the CDA looks to support the transformation of business signage to the standards developed several years ago and meant to bring greater uniformity throughout the Village.

This Summer/Fall we will undertake eight (8) roadway projects. Generally, they will all take place in the central and eastern part of the Village. All affected property owners were contacted and invited to attend a session of *Public Information Meetings* in mid-February. Because none of the projects is considered a 'street urbanization' (new curb & gutter placement) there will be no special assessments levied to individual property owners. Rather, this is considered (roadway) maintenance and the cost will be absorbed by the Village, just like last year's *Lake Breeze* project.

Finally, the Parks Recreation & Urban Tree Board, a special subcommittee and Staff have been busy preparing for springtime plantings in the new *Sherwood Community Forest* and our upcoming 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration in August. If you would like to choose a tree to be planted in the community forest in your name, or wish to get involved helping out in our anniversary festivities, please contact Parks & Recreation Coordinator Brenda Stumpf at the Village Hall.

## 214 DOGS ARE NOT YET LICENSED

It is state law that all dogs five (5) months and older are licensed annually by **March 31st**. Proof of current rabies vaccination is required. 2018 dog licenses are GREEN. *If your license is currently gold, it is expired!* The fee for a neutered male or spayed female is \$5, and unaltered dog is \$10. **After March 31st you will be charged a late fee.** If you no longer have your pet, please contact the Village Office at (920) 989-1589 so we can remove the pet from our database. ## VILLAGE CODE REMINDERS– NUISANCES

**NOXIOUS WEEDS** — Pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes, Section 66.96 and Section 7-1 of the Village Municipal Code, notice is hereby given to each person who owns, occupies, or controls land in the Village of Sherwood, Calumet County, WI to **DESTROY ALL NOXIOUS WEEDS AND CUT RANK GROWTH** on such property. Noxious weeds are: Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge, Field Bindweed (Creeping Jenny), Lythrum (Purple Loosestrife), and Multiflora Rose. Photographs and additional information on these noxious weeds can be found on our website at [www.villageofsherwood.org/weeds](http://www.villageofsherwood.org/weeds). Rank growth includes lawns, grasses, and other vegetative growth on undeveloped lots or platted parcels of land which exceed eight (8) inches in length except for property in designated floodplain, wetland, or storm water detention areas. If you fail to comply to the parcel vegetative height allowance, a subcontractor (or Village Public Works) will cut the rank growth at the property owner's expense and other related charges (costs associated with subcontractor plus Village municipal fees, which are more severe for each offense) shall be rolled to tax roll if left unpaid.

**NOISE** — Nice weather brings people outdoors. Please be considerate of your neighbors. Windows are open, welcoming the fresh air; be aware of noise pollution especially during night hours (10 PM to 7 AM). Besides prohibiting noxious weeds, Village Code 7-10 prohibits public nuisances such as animals running at large, fireworks, junk vehicles, and loud and unnecessary noise.

**DOGS** — Please be considerate of your neighbors and don't let your dog roam outside the yard or bark excessively. When walking around the neighborhood or on one of our many trails, please pick up your litter and dog waste. (There are numerous doggie waste stations throughout the Village for easy disposal!) Dogs must be licensed, leashed and within your control.

**CAMPFIRES/OPEN BURNING**— At this time, the Village does not require a permit for a campfire/open burn. However, please keep these items in mind before you burn:

- Contact the Harrison Fire/Rescue for updates on fire conditions (989-1062).
- Burning garbage is a nuisance and is not allowed.
- It is best to host a fire when weather conditions allow the fire to burn safely from start to finish.
- Make sure you are at least 30 feet away from any structure.
- Be courteous about your neighbors. The municipal code regulates nuisances and smoke — Please refrain from having an outdoor fire on a windy day—you wouldn't want to smoke-out your neighbor! ▲



**SHERWOOD COMMUNITY FOREST**



Want to become part of a Sherwood living legacy? How about purchasing a tree in your name, or for someone else, in the brand new Sherwood Community Forest? Our community reforestation program now allows individuals to pick out a tree, have a name marker attached in their honor, and Staff will place trees in the forest. The 7-acre forest lies along Golf Course Road between the 13th and 14th holes of High Cliff Golf Course. Cost for the program is \$30 per tree and plaque. # SHERWOOD WATER AND UTILITY

**What is a Cross Connection?** - A cross connection is an actual or potential connection between the safe drinking water (potable) supply and a source of contamination or pollution. State plumbing codes require approved backflow prevention methods to be installed at every point of potable water connection and use. Cross-connections must be properly protected or eliminated.

**How does contamination occur?** - When you turn on your faucet, you expect the water to be as safe as when it left the treatment plant. However, certain hydraulic conditions left unprotected within your plumbing system may allow hazardous substances to contaminate your own drinking water or even the public water supply.


**Backsiphonage** — May occur due to a loss of pressure in the municipal water system during a fire fighting emergency, a water main break or system repair. This creates a siphon in your plumbing system, which can draw water out of a sink or bucket and back into your water or the public water system.

**Backpressure** — May be created when a source of pressure (such as a boiler) creates a pressure greater than the pressure supplied from the public water system. This may cause contaminated water to be pushed into your plumbing system through an unprotected cross connection.


## Hand Held Shower Fixture

**A hand held shower is compliant if:**

- 1 — When shower head is hanging freely, it is at least 1" above top of the flood level rim of the receptor (tub)
- 2 — Complies with **ASSE#1014**
- 3 — Has the **ASME code 112.18.1** stamped on the handle



1" Minimum AIR GAP Above Tub From Fixture Outlet




## Toilet Tanks

There are many unapproved toilet tank fill valve products sold at common retailers which do not meet the state plumbing code requirements for backflow prevention:


- 1 — Look for the **ASSE #1002 Standard** symbol on the device and packaging
- 2 — Replace any unapproved devices with **ASSE #1002** approved anti-siphon ball-cock assembly. Average cost is typically \$12 to \$22 at home improvement stores.
- 3 — Verify overflow tube is 1" below critical level (CL) marking on the device.

## Did You Know... ?



Your water can become contaminated if connections of your plumbing system are not properly protected! The purpose of the local Cross-Connection Control Program, as required by the State Plumbing Code and Regulations (and WI Dept. of Natural Resources), is to ensure that everyone in the community has safe, clean drinking water.

To avoid contamination, backflow preventers are required by State Plumbing Code wherever there is an actual or potential hazard for cross-connection.

All public water suppliers are required to maintain an on-going Cross-Connection Program involving public education, onsite inspections, and possible corrective actions by building owners if required.

## Insights to Protect Your Drinking Water...

- Do:**
- 1 — Keep the ends of hoses clear of all possible contaminants.
  - 2 — Make sure dishwashers are installed with a proper "air gap" device.
  - 3 — Verify and install a **hose bibb vacuum breaker** on all threaded faucets around your home.
  - 4 — Make sure water treatment devices such as water softeners have the proper "air gap", which is a minimum of 1" inch above any drain.
- Don't:**
- 1 — Submerge hoses in buckets, pools, tubs, sinks or ponds.
  - 2 — Use spray attachments without a backflow prevention device.
  - 3 — Connect waste pipes from water softeners or other treatment systems directly to the sewer or submerged drain pipe. Always be sure there is a 1" "air gap" separation.



## **OTHER UTILITY NEWS AND REMINDERS:**

**NEW METER EQUIPMENT INSTALLATION NOTICE** — The Village of Sherwood is in the process of transitioning its water read equipment to radio transmission. As a customer of Sherwood Water & Sewer Utility, please be advised that this project will span over the next two (2) years since the project's start last year.

We will be sending out formal notices to the effected customers for 2018. We kindly ask for your cooperation on this important project, so to ensure the Village's proper compliance with the WI Public Service Commission.

**HYDRANT FLUSHING** — The Sherwood Water Dept. will begin its annual flushing program on **April 30-May 11**, excluding weekends. **Flushing will be done during daylight hours from 7:30 AM to 3:00 PM.**

Customers are advised to check for discoloration prior to washing clothes. If water utility employees are seen working in your area, please use as little, or if possible, no water for 45 minutes to insure the water has settled and discoloration is not drawn into the home's water heater or softener. We advise that you wait until 4:00 PM before washing clothes to minimize potential discoloration.

If discoloration persists, customers are advised to wait another 30-45 minutes, then draw from the discolored water through the **COLD WATER FAUCET ONLY**. Flushing removes most of the sediment of natural minerals such as iron and sulfur that are harmless, but can discolor water.

**FATS, OILS, GREASE** — Household greases ("cooking oils" and "fat byproducts") are not to be disposed of down your kitchen sink/toilet into the sanitary sewers. Please throw products in the trash.

**HYGIENIC PRODUCTS NOT FLUSHABLE** — Do **NOT** flush products such as sanitary napkins, disposable baby wipes/wet wipes, or dental floss. The package may be market the item "flushable", but it unfortunately causes backup issues and headaches for our utility personnel. Please help our WWTP by throwing these hygiene products in the trash.

**Illicit Discharge**—For the health, safety, environment and general welfare of the citizens of the Village of Sherwood, residents may not discharge pollutants in their drains, sinks, etc. that would contaminate the municipal waters.

## **From the Harrison Fire Department**

Harrison Fire Rescue wants to remind the community that Smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors need to be replaced every 10 years. During the past four years, Harrison Fire Rescue has been dispatched *85 times* for what we classify as "False Alarms", where a detector was alarming the residents, but there was no hazards found when our members investigated. A large percentage of these calls had either Smoke Alarms or Carbon Monoxide (CO) Alarms that were older than 10 years old.

Why do alarms need to be changed? Smoke and Carbon Monoxide alarms use sensors to see if a hazard exists in your home. These sensors do lose their sensitivity over time, making a false alarm more likely. Also, the air in our home contains dust and other contaminates that can build up on these sensors. Not only do they alarm falsely, there is a risk that when you need them, they won't alert you in a timely manner, or even worse, they won't alert you at all. The recommendation to replace them every 10 years comes from the United States Fire Administration, the federal government's fire & emergency prevention bureau.

You may have heard the phrase "Change your Clocks, Change your batteries". This year, check to see when your detectors were manufactured, if they are 10 years old or older, it's time to just replace the whole detector. You even have the option to purchase a new one that has a 10 year battery life, making that annual change less likely. Follow these four steps:

1. Remove your detector from the wall or ceiling.
2. Look at the back of the detector for the date of manufacture.
3. If the date is from 2008 or older, replace the detector.
4. If the date is less than 10 years, replace the battery and reinstall the detector.



Harrison Fire Rescue is here to help if you have questions or need assistance. While we enjoy meeting the residents we protect, preventing emergency responses to "false alarms" helps reduce the costs of fire protection and reduces risks to those in our community. If your alarms are sounding and you are unsure why, do not hesitate to call, Harrison Fire Rescue will help you find the problem!

### What to do with Latex Paint?

Latex paint is **NOT** considered a hazardous material. One easy way to dispose of latex paint is the leave the lid off and let the paint fully dry (this can be sped up by stirring in cat litter). ### VILLAGE BULK ITEM PICK UP:

**Mon., May 14, 2018**

**Items accepted for collection include:** Furniture, rolled carpeting (4 foot maximum length), cabinets, countertops, mattresses/bed springs, non-metal doors, wood windows, wooden playground equipment, large appliances without Freon (stoves, washers, dryers, etc. allowed if item can be handled by two people safely).

### What to do with Used Oil and Filters?

Oil filters and absorbents have been banned from landfill disposal since 2011. However, certain places will take used oil and oil filters. # International Migratory Bird Day



## Connecting People to Bird Conservation Celebrating 20 Years of International Migratory Bird Day(s) 20 Ways to Conserve Birds



In celebration of International Migratory Bird Day's 20th Anniversary (with the help of biologists, educators, conservationists, birdwatchers, and bird enthusiasts) 20 issues and simple solutions are presented in the hope of connecting people to bird conservation and engaging people in actions that help birds.

**Windows collide with birds!** Collisions are a frequent cause of bird death – especially during migrations. Birds can see trees or the sky reflected in windows or mistake houseplants for outdoor plants – they don't see glass! You can help by making your windows more visible to birds.



### Put a leash on!

Unleashed dogs and outdoor cats can harm birds by disturbing, chasing, and even killing them. Keeping your cat indoors and your dog from straying can protect birds.

**Leave Fledglings Where You Find Them!** Young chicks that have just left the nest (fledglings) may spend several days on the ground before they are able to fly. You can help by keeping people and pets away. Typically, parents continue to care for them. If you think a bird is truly an orphan, call a wildlife rehabilitator for instructions. For information about finding a wildlife rehabilitator please visit - <http://www.nrawildlife.org/content/finding-rehabilitator>

**Clean Your Bird Feeders!** Dirty feeders can spread disease. Disinfect and clean out old seed from feeders frequently and put fresh water in your bird bath every few days.



**Don't Buy Illegally-Caged Birds!** Selling wild-caught birds as pets is illegal. Buy only captive-bred birds. Make certain that the breeder or pet store is reputable.

**Use Cloth Grocery Bags and Reusable Bottles!** Birds that mistakenly eat plastic trash can become ill or even die. Avoiding plastic bags and bottles reduces plastic pollution and conserves resources.



**Recycle!** Anything you recycle reduces litter and saves resources. Get creative! You can make a bag from used juice containers and bird feeders from old dishes and plastic bottles.

**Restore Natural Habitat in Your Community!** Birds need a place to live and many bird habitats are disappearing. City parks and open spaces are natural places for birds. Work with your community to recreate the habitat that once existed in your area.



**Plant Native!** Native plants provide food, nest sites, and cover for birds. Birds can use native plants as a food source, a place to raise their young and as a place to escape predators.

**Keep Your Distance!** Birds need space for feeding, nesting, and other daily activities. Approaching too closely may cause them to become nervous and deplete much-needed energy reserves. During the nesting season, it may even result in loss of eggs or young to predators.



**Slow Down When Driving!** Cars can kill millions of birds each year. Driving slower gives you more time to respond if there is an animal in the road and gives the animal plenty of time to get out of the way.

**Buy Bird Friendly Products!** You can help preserve bird habitat in Mexico, Central and South America and the Caribbean by buying shade-grown coffee and chocolate. Coffee grown in shade farms imitate native forests and have many more bird species than sun coffee farms.



**Teach Others About Birds!** Talk to your friends about birds and start a club in your community to teach people about the challenges birds face. The more people know, the more they can do to help.

**Get Outdoors and Enjoy Nature!** You can appreciate the bird habitat near your home. Find a local park and go for a walk or just stroll around your neighborhood.

**Take a Friend Bird Watching!** Invite a buddy and see if together you can spot more birds.

**Support Conservation!** Join a bird club or other conservation organization to learn more and contribute to protecting birds. Volunteer with organizations that preserve habitat and help birds.

**Be a Citizen Scientist!** Many projects need helpers to gather data on birds and their habitat. Contact your local Nature Center, library or conservation organization to volunteer.

**Reduce Energy Use!** Riding your bike or walking reduces your carbon footprint and prevents pollution of bird habitats. Switching the lights off in your house not only shrinks your energy bill, but can also help prevent birds from colliding with your windows.



**Avoid Chemicals!** Birds may accidentally eat pesticide and herbicide pellets or prey that have been poisoned. This can kill a bird or have toxic effects on their own health and that of their growing embryos, including deformation or suppressed immune systems.



**Learn the Hunting Laws!** Federal and local laws protect sensitive areas and manage the harvest of birds to ensure healthy populations. Purchase a **Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp** – these contribute to habitat which benefits all birds. Junior Ducks stamps help connect children to birds through art.
