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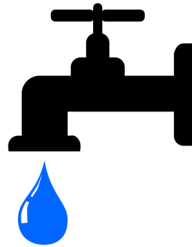

YARD WASTE SITE IS OPEN!!!

Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2pm-6pm, Saturdays from 8am-3pm, and Sundays from 9am-noon, May to October. The site (at intersection of Kesler and Military Rds.) is open to residents for disposal of grass clippings, brush, leaves, and branches (up to 4" in width).

FREE MULCH & COMPOST!!!

Free mulch and compost are available to Sherwood residents at the Yard Waste Site. Look for the mounds when you drive straight into the site. Please no loaders; Mulch and compost may be shoveled into buckets or onto trailers. Thank you.

Phosphorus from lawncare contributes to toxic blue-green algae growth in local waterways

Tips for a healthier lawn *and* local waterways this summer:

Mow often - Taller grass has deeper roots that prevent soil loss and help rain soak in. Cut no more than 1/3 the length of the grass each time you mow.

Don't bag - Leave clippings on your lawn to keep soil moist and return nutrients over time, use clippings as garden mulch, or compost them instead.

Sweep it up - If clippings get in the street or on sidewalks, sweep them back onto your lawn so they don't get washed into the storm drain when it rains.

Fertilize right - Chemicals are not necessary for a healthy lawn. If you do fertilize, think before you buy. Get a soil test to know how much nutrients your lawn really needs. Fertilize in fall, and sweep up any fertilizer that falls on the street or sidewalks to dispose of properly.

FROM THE SHERWOOD WATER AND UTILITY

UTILITY NEWS AND REMINDERS:

WATERING? Do you plan on planting a new lawn, major landscaping updates to your yard or filling a pool?

Twelve years ago Sherwood constructed a pipeline to the City of Appleton and became a wholesale customer.

Because we receive water from another municipality, we pay for 100% of all water pumped to your homes, regardless of where it ends up. Some residents ask if there is a way to receive a discounted rate for planting lawns or doing major landscaping. You don't need a permit to water new landscaping or lawn. However, the Village does not grant discounted rates.

SUMMER REMINDERS FROM PUBLIC WORKS

- Please remember land owners are prohibited to have grasses, lawns, and other vegetation such as noxious weeds and rank growth exceeding eight (8) inches in length or more per Village Municipal Code 7-10(f).
- When mowing, please direct clippings away from roadways and sidewalks. Clippings can clog the storm drains, cause drainage issues, and add unwanted material to our stormwater ponds and surrounding waterways.
- No unauthorized motorized vehicles are allowed on Village recreation trails, including ATVs, golf carts and construction vehicles.
- The rip rap around stormwater ponds stabilize the pond banks. Please do not throw the surrounding rocks into the ponds as this will lead to bank erosion.

Don't Lose Money to Scammers!



Recently the Calumet County Sheriff's Department received numerous fraud complaints from residents throughout the county. Within the past few months, the total amount of money that people have lost is close to \$100,000! The following are some examples of red flags for a scam.

The fraudsters use different techniques to misrepresent who they were in each phone call while utilizing the same technique to gain access to the victim's funds. In one scam, the victims were instructed to download software on either their computer or mobile device which allowed the suspects to gain access to the victim's device. This in turn allowed the suspects to gain access to the victim's online banking software along with any other investment accounts set up on the device. The suspects quickly exchange any funds they can gain access to into a cryptocurrency which is difficult to track and is usually sent overseas where the funds are unlikely to ever be recovered. To keep yourself safe from this type of criminal activity never allow a third party access to your computer or mobile device.

Another popular technique amongst criminals is to demand payment in Google, Apple, Ebay, or Visa gift cards. A legitimate business or organization will never ask for any payment to be made in gift cards. If you find yourself on the phone with someone telling you they need to access your computer or mobile device or demanding a payment in gift cards the best thing to do is hang up. If the scammer calls back do not answer the call and block that phone number.

In other recent incidents, fraudsters have called elderly people telling them their grandchild was in an accident, in the hospital, or in jail, and they need cash right away. People are then convinced to put several thousands of dollars in their mailbox to be picked up by "couriers" or representatives from the courts. Shortly thereafter, the money is picked up by the suspects and the money is gone. Again, legitimate government or bail bond transactions should be only be done at the courthouse.

In summary, be wary of people calling you on the phone and asking for immediate payments. Do not agree to give money or gift cards over the phone. When in doubt, call the Sheriff's Office for additional advice. Please, please share this information, especially with your elderly neighbors and relatives.

Get the Lowdown on Lyme Disease

Deer ticks spread Lyme disease across the United States, and Wisconsin is no exception. In 2020, Wisconsin had 3,076 estimated cases of Lyme disease. This number has more than doubled in the past 15 years. Lyme disease is preventable and treatable if you know the signs and symptoms. To ensure you have a fun and safe summer, we will help you understand what Lyme disease is, what the symptoms are, and how to prevent the disease.

What is Lyme Disease? Lyme disease is a bacterial infection you get from the bite of an infected tick. At first, Lyme disease usually starts with minor symptoms. If it is not treated early, the infection can spread and can cause Lyme arthritis, heart rhythm irregularities, facial palsy, impaired memory, and neuropathy. Prompt treatment can help you recover quickly.

What are the symptoms of Lyme disease? Symptoms include: fever, fatigue, body aches, headache, joint pain, neck stiffness, swollen lymph nodes, and Bullseye rash

How can you prevent Lyme disease? The best way to prevent Lyme disease is to cover up your skin and stay on walking paths when going outside. Also use insect repellent, and when you come inside check for ticks on clothes, skin, and pets. If you find a tick, remove with tweezers right away. Ticks can transmit Lyme disease after 24 hours of being attached to skin.

How do you treat Lyme disease? Antibiotics are very effective for treating Lyme disease. Early diagnosis improves outcome of treatment, so it is very important to contact your healthcare provider if you are feeling sick or develop a rash.

Help UW Madison researches by downloading The Tick App! Provides a short daily log (if you used any protective measurements against ticks, or found any ticks), a place to report ticks, and also can give you reminders to log tick activity. By using the features within this app, you are assisting in research to better understand how and where people are becoming exposed to ticks. This will help design better prevention strategies that reduce your exposure to ticks. The Tick App also provides information on how to remove ticks, prevent tick bites, and general information about ticks. If available, information is also provided about blacklegged / deer tick activity in your area.

From the Friends of High Cliff State Park

To obtain funds to continue improvements on the Sustaining the Butterfly Project, the Friends group is selling 6X6 inch anodized aluminum plaques to be installed on the refurbished sign near the trail's footbridge.

Please be a supporter. Money raised from plaque sales thus far have been used to provide interpretive signs identifying features of the trail. It is also a great way to memorize special people or pets.
