## Winter Reminders

### Winter Parking

Per Village of Sherwood Municipal Code Chapter 20, it is unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation, or any others to park or leave unattended any automobile, truck, or any other vehicle on any village street or any highway between the hours of 2:30AM and 6:30AM beginning November 1st and ending April 15th.

### Snow Removal Protocol

Snow on your property is your own responsibility. It is unlawful to shove accumulated snow from your property onto nearby vacant lots, ditches, or lots across the roadway. Also, as a reminder, do not plug-up your culvert ends, or you may regret it come springtime! ▲

The site (at intersection of Kesler Rd. and Military Rd.) will be open October, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2PM-6PM and Saturdays from 8AM-1PM, and the first three Saturdays in November (11/4, 11/11, and 11/18) from 9AM-12PM. ## From the Village Administrator...

Following an extremely wet Spring and Summer construction season we have finally buttoned up the Lake Breeze & Harrison Street roadway reconstruction projects, Wanick Park trail paving segments, and the Nuthatch Trail reconstruction project.

The Harrison Road repaving segment followed the very noticeable removal of three (3) older homes adjacent to what will be Sherwood's first daycare center, which is scheduled to open in January. Removal of the three homes makes further commercial redevelopment possible in accordance with our adopted *Historic Downtown Master Plan for Development*. Yes, the planters by the Post Office – STH 55/114 curve – will stay in place blocking access to the now discontinued Clifton Road section until new commercial development occurs. Ultimately, Harrison Street may be moved, or entirely removed, depending on the future lay-out of new commercial building(s) in that area.

Across the street on Military Road (CTH 'M') we have begun the process of converting another prior home site into a parking area. Scott Amrhein's former glass-working space in the Maurer building is expected to be converted into a commercial business space, and its patrons will need more parking than what Scott, and his limited staff, previously needed. The new parking area will be dedicated to new commercial business, and not open for general public parking.

This Spring, Public Works staff planted an additional 1,500 seedlings to support our commitment to being a *Tree City USA* participant. Over the past few years 6,500 seedlings have been planted in support of that effort. Our goal is threefold: Firstly, to have the Village be home to a diversified variety of tree stock that is less susceptible to invasive pests and tree diseases. Secondly, to be able to reforest areas of the community with our own stock that costs literally pennies per seedling to plant and grow. And, thirdly, for our residents to have access to and become participants in what will become the new *Sherwood Community Forest*.

The forest will lie on 6 acres of Village land between Golf Course Road and the 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> holes of the High Cliff Golf Course. Next Spring, and into the future, we will ask residents if anyone wishes to purchase a tree from our local tree stock and place it at a location of their choice. We hope to place either a marker, or 'tree collar,' with the name of the person whom the tree was planted for, including a date. The cost of placing a tree will be low by using our tree stock, and having staff and the resident(s) help dig, move, and plant the trees. It will truly be your *Sherwood Community Forest* into the long-term future. If you wish to see the area being prepared for this, simply walk the nature trail behind the condominiums on Golf Course Road until you find the cleared area.

Typical for this time of year, we are heading into *Budget Mode* for the next couple months during which time we will be outlining next year's, and the near future's, budget expenditures. Items on the immediate horizon are continued local road repaving projects, and the anticipated extension of a new road connecting the Mobil gas station and Village Hall up the hill past the water tank to a new intersection at CTH 'B' across from Jeannie's Bar. With the J&E Quarry closing down, this will hopefully open the field area across from Legion Park for future development and improvements to our local roadway system.

New residential housing continues to move forward at an impressive rate. Through August, 25 new home permits have been approved, pushing our 3-year total to 100+ new homes, and our population over 3,000. Available new home lots are near 'zero' so we anticipate a new subdivision coming forward this Winter.

## DOG LICENSING FOR 2018

Dog licenses for 2018 will be available for purchase at the Village Hall starting mid-December. All dogs 5 months or older are required by WI State Law to be registered with Calumet County. Licenses for unaltered dogs are \$10, whereas fixed dogs (neutered/spayed) are \$5. The Village Hall can take cash or checks. **Proof of rabies vaccination is required before a license can be issued.**

# Sherwood Water & Sewer Utility



## Responsibility of Laterals is Spilt between Provider and Consumer

Water laterals providing service to customers generally consist of two parts. The utility-owned portion of the lateral is generally located in the public right-of-way and includes the section of the lateral from the main to the curb stop box. The customer-owned portion of the water lateral generally extends from the curb stop box to the property provided with service.

Wisconsin Admin. Code § PSC 185.52 requires that mains and laterals be placed at such depth or otherwise protected as will prevent freezing. Generally, if a freeze-up occurs in the main or utility-owned portion of the lateral, the utility is responsible for the expense of thawing its facilities. Individual customers generally may not be held responsible for the expense of thawing utility-owned laterals or mains.

If a freeze-up occurs in the customer-owned portion of a lateral, Wis. Admin. Code § PSC 185.88 specifies the situations when the utility is responsible for the expense of thawing the customer's portion of the lateral, and when the customer is responsible for the expense. This section provides that the utility is responsible for the expense of thawing the customer-owned portion of a lateral if it is the first thaw for the customer at the location, the lateral is electrically conductive, and the utility has not given notice to the customer to take corrective actions for a known condition (e.g., a notice that the customer should increase the lateral depth or provide insulation to prevent freezing). The utility is also responsible if the freeze-up is the direct result of a utility disconnection that occurred during a time when the freeze-up could be reasonably expected to occur.

Generally, customers should be provided with these "known condition" notices so customers have time to take corrective actions to protect their laterals from freezing before the ground freezes. In order to ensure the notice is provided to the customer, utilities generally provide the notice in the form of a letter, door hanger, bill insert, documented phone call, or email. Media like radio, TV, newspapers and websites are unsuitable for this notice, as these forms of media would not address the specific known condition at an individual customer's property and may not even reach all the customers with known conditions.

Under Wis. Admin. Code § PSC 185.88, the customer is responsible for the expense of thawing a freeze-up in the customer's portion of the lateral if the customer's lateral is not electrically conductive, the customer neglected to provide or maintain proper insulation or protection, the utility

advises the customer of corrective measures to be taken and the customer does not follow the utility's advice, or if the utility disconnects for a dangerous conditions.

## Preventative Measures for Winter — How to Avoid Freezing Pipes

As our weather gets colder, our pipes are under extreme pressure – from water! Water expands as it freezes, which puts intense stress on metal and plastic pipes. This pressure (no matter how strong the pipe) can still cause pipes to crack or break. Unheated interiors such as basements, sprinkler lines, garages, crawl spaces, attics and kitchen cabinets are likely household areas where this can occur, but exterior exposed pipes with little to no insulation are also subject to freezing.

Here are some helping tips to help prevent pipes from freezing:

- Drain lines from outside sources such as those for swimming pools and sprinkler lines (per manufacturer directions).
- Detach, drain, and store hoses kept outdoors. Close inside valves supplying outdoor hose bibs. Open outside hoses bibs to allow water to drain. Keep the outside valve open so that any water remaining in the pipe can expand without causing the pipe to break.
- Open kitchen and bathroom cabinetry to let warm air get at your pipes.
- If you turn on a faucet and only a trickle comes out, suspect a frozen pipe. Likely places for frozen pipes include against exterior walls or where your water service enters your home through the foundation.
- If you will be going away during the cold winter, leave the heat inside your home (set it no lower than 55 °F).
- Apply heat until full water pressure is restored. If you are unable to locate the frozen area, if the frozen area is not accessible, or if you can not thaw the pipe, call a licensed plumber.
- Check all other faucets in your home to find out if you have additional frozen pipes. If one pipe freezes, others may freeze, too.

Being prepared and informed for the winter season will help you avoid the unpleasant and costly situation of frozen pipes. ▲

## From the Calumet County Sheriff



The Calumet County Sheriff's Department have received multiple complaints of people speeding within the Village of Sherwood. We are currently stopping vehicles going 45-50 miles per hour in 25 miles per hour speed zones. When caught, many of the people found in violation of the speed limits have been Village residents. Speeding tickets are very expensive, and the forfeiture amount is set by the State of Wisconsin. The cheapest speeding ticket we can issue is \$175.30 for going 1-15 miles per hour over the posted speed limit. For example, a vehicle going 41 miles per hour in a posted 25 mile per hour speed zone, would received a forfeiture amount of \$200.50 ticket and 4 points assessed against the driver's license. PLEASE SLOW DOWN!!!

## From Harrison Fire-Rescue

### Saving Time!!!

In 2017, time is a valuable commodity. There never seems to be enough of it on our very busy schedules and lives. In an emergency, time becomes a factor in the equation that might mean life or death. If you, or a loved one, suffers a life threatening medical event, the time it takes to begin medical interventions is a critical component. If yours, or a neighbor's, house catches fire, that fire could double in size every minute.

There are two things that YOU can do to improve the time it takes to help reach you. First, how easy is it to identify your address? If your home is currently equipped with a green reflective number placed near the road, then it is no problem. Please ensure that the number is visible from both directions on the road. If you do not have a reflective number, contact the Village Office today at (920) 989-1589.

Secondly, if you are in an area that is protected by a fire hydrant? Is that fire hydrant visible? Can you see this hydrant covered with flowers?



Firefighters need to be able to quickly find the nearest hydrant in case of an emergency. Make sure that you are not landscaping around a fire hydrant because they need to be accessible in times of testing and emergencies.

Also, in the winter, make sure that there is a six-foot radius cleared of snow around the fire hydrant. Think about adopting a fire hydrant!

## Calumet County Public Health 2017-18 Seasonal Flu Shots

It's the time to make sure you, your family, your friends and co-workers get protected. Safe and inexpensive, the influenza (flu) vaccine will protect millions of Wisconsin children and adults. The Calumet County Health Division will be offering flu shots to the community.

Flu vaccine for adults with Medicare Part B or "Medicare Advantage Plans" will be billed by the Health Division. Please remember to bring your insurance cards to the clinic.

For all other adults (19 years and older) there will be a \$35.00 charge for the flu vaccine. This year, we will only have the flu shot available.

Flu vaccine for children (6 months through 18 years of age) will be provided **FREE ONLY if:**

- a. the child's health insurance will NOT cover the vaccine, or
- b. the child has Medical Assistance (BadgerCare, Forward Health, BadgerCare Plus), or
- c. the child is Native American or Alaskan Native.

All other children, (3 years through 18 years of age) with insurance coverage can receive the vaccine for a fee of \$35.00.

## Calumet County Bat Tests Positive for Rabies

Calumet County Public Health reports that a bat found in Calumet County in August 2017 tested positive for rabies. There was no known human or animal exposure to the bat. Health officials want the public to be aware that skunks, foxes, raccoons, livestock, dogs, and cats can carry rabies. Calumet County Public Health is reminding residents to be cautious around wild animals and to take steps to protect their families, pets, and livestock from rabies.

Rabies is a virus that severely affects the central nervous system. The virus is spread from animals to humans through animal's saliva when someone is bitten, scratched, or the animal's saliva comes in contact with broken skin. If someone is bitten, scratched, or licked on broken skin, immediately clean the wound with soap and water.

All animal bites should be reported to local law enforcement and should be evaluated by a health professional to determine if treatment is necessary. Rabies vaccine administered after a possible exposure is highly effective at preventing the progression to rabies disease. However, if preventive treatment is not administered before signs of rabies develop, the disease is virtually always fatal.

Calumet County Public Health recommends the following precautions to protect yourself and your family from possible exposure to rabies:

- Report any sick or strange acting wildlife to local authorities.
- Vaccinate pets. Vaccinating pets provides protection for the animal and helps keep the rabies virus from spreading between wild animals and people.
- Do not feed wildlife or stray animals and discourage animals from seeking food near your home. Keep garbage cans tightly covered and avoid storing food outside.
- Do not approach an unknown animal, either wild or domestic, especially if it is acting in a strange or unusual manner.
- Report all animal bites and all contact with bats to local law enforcement. Timely reporting of animal bites allows for prompt investigation and allows public health experts to offer recommendations regarding rabies vaccination.
- Keep bats out of your living quarters. Make sure screens are in good repair and close any openings that could allow bats to enter.

## Bird City Update

Are you ready for some football??? Wisconsinites love their football, and love their Green Bay Packers. But green and gold are not the only colors found here in the Village of Sherwood during this lovely time of year. In subdued colors approximately 30 species of wood warblers can be seen during the Fall migration. You may, also, spot an abundance of Ruby-throated hummingbirds, or shorebirds in your garden as they fuel up for their long journey to Mexico, or Central America. You may even see a gray-bodied, crimson-capped Sandhill Crane as they move to "staging areas" in Wisconsin before their Fall migration.

So head over to the High Cliff State Park and the shores of Lake Winnebago to watch for these beautiful birds, and the multitude of colors that Autumn brings to Sherwood.
